



da_FTP is a simple application for uploading files to an ftp server using command line parameters.

Getting Started

System requirements

da_FTP has been tested to work under Windows XP, though it should work fine on Vista & Windows 7 systems.

Getting help

To set the various options, simply run **da_FTP** with no parameters. This is known as "GUI mode".

The settings and sound file list are stored in an XML file, located in the same folder as the program. This XML file will be generated the first time **da_FTP** is closed.

Tray Icon

When **da_FTP** is minimised, it will disappear from the taskbar and move to the system tray. Double clicking the icon in the system tray will restore the program again. You can also left click the system tray icon and choose to restore or exit the program. When the program is minimised to the system tray, the icon will appear brighter when connected to the FTP server.

Windows Firewall

The first time **da_FTP** uploads, you'll probably see a Windows Firewall message. Click the "Unblock" button to allow the program access to your FTP site. You should only see this message the first time the program uploads a file.

Command Line Usage

In the following example, the file "test.txt" will be uploaded via FTP.

```
da_ftp.exe "test.txt"
```

The file extension of the file (.txt in this example) will be kept, but its name will be changed to the one specified by the first Remote Filename specified in the settings. By default, this is called "uploaded". So, on the ftp site, this file will appear as "uploaded.txt".

An optional second parameter can be used to select which Remote Filename will be used as the uploaded file's name. To use this option, use a number between 1 and the number of items in the Remote Filename list.

```
da_ftp.exe "test.txt" "6"
```

In the above example, the specified file will be uploaded using the 6th name specified in the Remote Filename list. If the number specified in the second parameter is less than 1 or greater than the number of items in the Remote Filename list, it will default back to using the first name in the list.

To send more than one file in one command line session, do this:

```
da_ftp.exe "file1.txt" "5" "file2.txt" "3"
```

In the above example, "file1.txt" will be uploaded using the 5th name specified in the Remote Filename list. "File2.txt" will

be uploaded using the 3rd name specified in the Remote Filename list.
